Lead-in activity

Before reading *Small, Speckled Egg* help children identify the title, author, illustrator and blurb on the front and back covers. Study the front cover and ask:

- What animals can you identify?
- Why do you think these animals are on the front cover?
- What do you think the book will be about?

Main activity

The text has two levels. You can enjoy reading the main text out loud with younger children, and include the supporting text for more advanced learners. After reading, ask the following questions to check for understanding, promote deeper thinking and prompt further discussion.

The egg:

- What words can you use to describe the egg?
- How does the chick get out of the egg?
- Do you know any other animals that hatch from eggs?

Setting:

- Where in the world does the chick hatch?
- Is it a hot place or a cold place?
- Where do the terns go in the winter?
- What are other names for the Arctic and Antarctic?

The main character:

- What type of bird is the book's main character?
- What does she eat?
- How do her parents protect her?
- How does she learn to fly?

The plot:

- What predators do terns have in the Arctic?
- Why do the family leave their home in the Arctic every year?
- How do they eat on their journey?
- Where do they sleep when they are flying over the sea?
- How many chicks can a female tern have in her lifetime?









LIFE CYCLE OF A BIRD

Lead-in activity

Small, Speckled Egg tells the story of the life cycle of an Arctic tern. When you read the story, stress the different stages as you read from egg to chick, fledgling to adult.

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Main activity


Print out both pages and help the children to cut out the pictures. The challenge is to put them in the correct order in the bird's lifecycle on the worksheet, and then to label each stage using the word bank. Encourage them to write the labels, or they can cut out the words to stick on.



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
ARCTIC OR ANTARCTIC?

Lead-in activity

Small, Speckled Egg tells the story of the Arctic terns' migration from their Arctic nesting grounds to their summer feeding arounds in the Antarctic. Other animals share their habitats. Some are mentioned but there are more in the illustrations. Encourage your children to explore the scenes to find them..

Main activity

Some polar animals live only in the Arctic or Antarctic, while a few, like Arctic terns, visit both. Draw lines between the animal and where they live, following the example.









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CREATIVE WRITING

Lead-in activity


Small, Speckled Egg starts with an egg and ends with the Arctic tern's migratory journey, flying around the world. The bold text in the book is the main story, simply told, easy to read and easy to follow. Read that with your children to prepare them for some creative writing.

Main activity


Time to write a story that starts with something very small and ends with something very big! Here's some prompts that might inspire your children to write their own short story, or they might have ideas of their own.

Read *Small, Speckled Egg* and look at the illustrations together, paying particular attention to the information the children will need to answer the questions below.




The Arctic tern has the longest migration of any bird. How far do they fly each year?

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
PARTS OF A BIRD

Lead-in activity

Small, Speckled Egg includes much of the vocabulary needed to identify the parts of a bird. Pay particular attention to this when reading the story so children hear the words, such as beak and wing, and understand their meanings
